Aho! Greetings to all Band Members. First, I want to thank all of you who have greeted me with open arms. I know this is a time of great change. I came here with a great story I wanted to share about the Wolf people. Back home, I am part of the Bear Clan. We are supposed to watch over the community like a police force. This is to keep everything in check for our culture, language, governance, and over enforcement of the rules. We are called Coonake (Cho-Na-Kay). Our greatest friends are the Wolf Clan.

When I was small, I wanted to change my Indian name to Grey Wolf (Sukjak Xoc Ka). I never knew why for a long time. I had this realization driving to work last week that now I was working with the "Fierce Wolf People." It was

quite a revelation to see it from a quantum physics point of view. I was like wow, exciting! I kept saying that in my mind, "Fierce Wolf Nation, Fierce Wolf Nation...(howl)." I could even hear that howl in the background.

I just want people to know that sometimes change can be quite scary. I want to provide a baseline of trust, honesty, and integrity with my words and actions. If you have a question, I have an open-door policy. If you have Zoom, Microsoft Teams, Web Ex, Facebook, or just about any other medium, I would like to speak with you and hear your words, your ideas, your stories, your complaints, your criticisms of how we are doing.

I hope all of you are doing well despite all the COVID-19 that is happening around us. During this fine holiday season, I hope you provide for the ones you love most. I love my morning drive. I know it is supposed to be a rat race, but I love seeing the mountains. I heard some stories about them, and I was enamored by their majestic beauty.

Updates

- Cannabis law SFN is scheduled to open its first dispensary this month. This is a huge economic
 move that will bring a lot of opportunity, including many jobs. Indigenous Bloom is fixing up the
 old Busy Bear Daycare.
- 2. Smoke Shack We are wanting this to open as well to match the dispensary and bring in more revenue.
- 3. Update all forms, laws, documents. This is a six-month project with all departments.
- 4. Sumas First Nation to enter a name change. Right now, we are looking at a whole new marketing campaign for Semá:th to be the name again from a traditional point of view.
- 5. Encourage Language and Culture to all employees, band members, and programs, especially values embedded with words, ideas, and land.
- 6. Developing better protocols for customer service to all people at all buildings.
- 7. Listen to employees and their concerns for a safe and healthy work environment. Currently working 3-month plan, including timely communication.

OLD BUSY BEAR GETS FACE LIFT FOR NEW INDIGENOUS BLOOM DISPENSARY

The old versus the new is quite a sight at the Old Busy Bear Daycare. The transformation has been quite quick since SXDL Economic Development signed its partnership with Indigenous Bloom.

Now that the permit was granted, renovations have been fast and furious to get done. A crew hired by Indigenous Bloom has come in and done the work in record time.

The crew made modifications to the old building. "We wish we could have done the extensive work of raising the place to be level all around. However, the water that came from up the road made an impact on the grade towards the building," explained the site foreman. "We

made it better though. It's usable now."

There is a lot of excitement to see how this new venture will perform in this location. Then in May 2021, when the Kilgard Business Park comes into play, the dispensary will move to its new location. It is slated to open soon.

The renovations will be done in nine (9) days. This is surprising that it could be brought online so fast. 14 SFN Band Members have applied for different positions in the new business and training for all will happen soon.

There is a great security system in place. This building will be like no other, and LFFA will use the building once the dispensary moves to Kilgard. This is an incredible considering its use plan to serve the community in multiple ways.

Annex School Update: Semá:th Stó:mex Totí:lta:wtxw (Sumas Warrior Place of Learning).

Our Collaborative Community Kindergarten to Grade 12 school has successfully completed their first quarter and has had many highlights so far. We would like to take the time to celebrate these highlights with you. One of our first significant shared learning experiences was around Orange Shirt Day. Our school took the week to honour residential school survivors and their families, as well as personally respect the opportunity to intertwine traditional and curricular learning together this year. Students expressed appreciation for learning their own songs, stories, and language. Students then created orange shirts with good intentions and with one another. On Orange Shirt Day we went around the community to drum and sing for some of our elders. It was a day full of heart.



Another significant learning experience was that our students explored the draining of the Sumas Lake. Students in Grades 4 through 8, went to the REACH Gallery exhibits: Semá:th Xo:tsa and Our Living Languages, and then journeyed around Abbotsford and Chilliwack to recognize the scope of the lake's area as well as to hear stories of the lake and the life that resided in the lake. In Halq'eméylem, students learned place names and stories. In Social Studies, students learned about the historical changes to the physical landscape and communicated the relationship between land and culture. The older students have now taken the time to read Thetáx Chris Silver, Xémontélót Carrielynn Victor, Kris Foulds and Laura Schneider's book Semá:th Xo:tsa to the younger

students. Students were gifted with their very own copy of this special book. Please encourage the children around you to read this book with you (virtually or in-person).



Students and teachers then prepared for our Opening and Naming Ceremony by practicing singing and drumming, preparing giveaways, inviting a couple of guests (only a couple due to COVID safety rules at the time), and learning to use our voices with confidence. Markus Ned created a song for our school and taught his peers the song. We are looking forward to a day when we can share this song with you all. Unfortunately, as COVID numbers increased, we were required to postpone our ceremony, but it is with honour and respect that we share our school name with you now: Semá:th Stó:mex Totí:lta:wtxw (Sumas Warrior Place of Learning).

In addition to the various learning opportunities, students are having fun with one another. Students come together as supportive families especially during buddy reading, practicing the Halq'eméylem alphabet, and our Morning Prayer. Below you will see a couple of photos just for fun: Our Pajama Spirit Day (organized by our Senior Students) and Hallowe'en. Our students also really enjoyed themselves on our Pow Wow Day, led by Ms. Julian. Coming up next, our littles will be doing a gingerbread man unit where students will be happily baking and decorating gingerbread cookies.



Learning is strengthened through connections and community. One of the learning focuses that our students are involved with right now is about Salmon. Students are currently learning about Salmon and have spent time watching the Salmon in the creek. After some discussions around Salmon, without being asked, some of the students spent time after school cleaning up some garbage around the creek to care for the Salmon. Together students have discussed spawning and why it is important to not disturb the creek or the fish while the salmon spawn. Students in Grades 1 through 3 are learning about preservation. Students in Grades 4 through 8 are investigating personal inquiry questions and will have a "Salmon Fair" where they share and celebrate their learning with one another. Some of our seniors have been learning how to process and smoke Salmon. Please share fishing stories and family spots and how you preserve salmon for your family with the children in the community. We greatly appreciate your knowledge and involvement in our students' learning journeys.


