We had some maintenance work done at our preschool. The decks were fixed, the preschool was painted, and the floors were buffed.


We also purchased some new cultural carpets and a much-needed storage bin!

### Peló:qes (Torch Season) January 23 - February 20

Within the heart of Sumas First Nation, the lunar year unfolds gracefully across the Fraser Valley, a sacred dance choreographed by the changing seasons and the moon's gentle rhythms. Long before the arrival of newcomers, our ancestors wove a profound connection with the land, attributing names to months and seasons in the rich tapestry of the Upper Stó:lō dialects of the Halq'emeylem Language.

The Syilolem, our sacred year, embarks on its journey around October, aligning with the earth's natural pulse. Temhilalxw, the fall, whispers of transitions as nature prepares for winter. Temxeytl', the cold time, settles in as winter unfolds, followed by temqw'iles, the season for things to come up, echoing the rebirth of spring. Temkw'okw'es, the hot time, symbolizes the warmth of summer, a season of abundance and growth.

In harmony with the lunar cycle, each month, or moon, spans about 29 days. Our people linked each moon to the first sliver that graced the sky after the "burnt out moon." Our connection to nature extended to the meticulous tracking of days and months, with knot-tying and stick-planting individuals in Yale, B.C. Time's passage was marked not by rigid calculations but by the events described in the month names, underscoring the importance of natural phenomena.

Peló:qes, the fourth month, making its presence felt around January, holds a unique significance for us. Translated as "torch season," Peló:qes is the time when torches, crafted from dried sockeye salmon heads, are fashioned for our nocturnal fishing expeditions. The peló:qel torches cast a soft glow, lighting up the waters as our fishermen spear fish from canoes. The clear January waters reflect the light, aiding in the age-old hunt for fish that sustains our people. While the traditional torches made from salmon heads were once intrinsic to this season, the modern era has seen the adoption of pitch torches and lanterns for practicality. Nevertheless, the essence of Peló:qes, with its connection to fishing and the natural world, remains a vital part of our Sumas First Nation heritage.

In navigating the contemporary world, it is our duty to honor and share these cultural treasures, preserving the Sumas First Nation lunar calendar and the unique traditions woven into Peló:qes. Through this, we not only mark the passage of time but celebrate the enduring spirit of our people intricately entwined with the cyclical rhythms of nature. Peló:qes is not just a season; it's a living tradition that connects us to our ancestors and the timeless dance of the moon and seasons.
