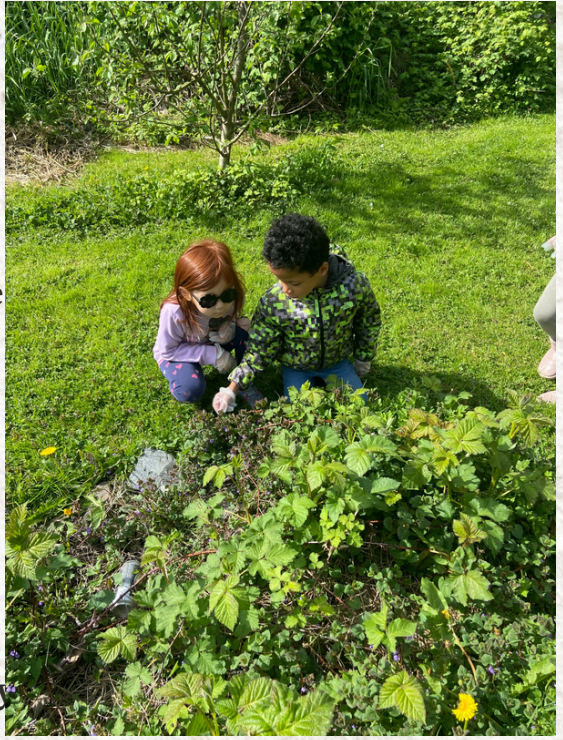
We are learning about salmon, gardening, and the 7th teaching, Sabe (honesty). Also, with the weather getting warmer, we have been enjoying water play.

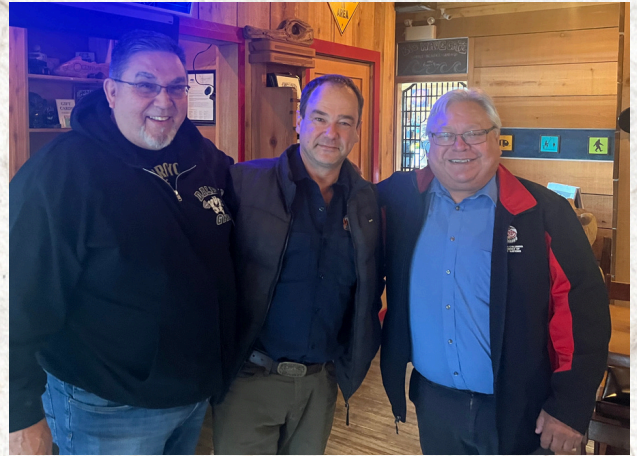


GOVERNANCE AND NATURAL RESOURCES UPDATES

The Governance and Natural Resources Department, in collaboration with Chief and Council, engaged in strategic planning and relationship building with the Redd Fish Restoration Society in Ucluelet, BC, in the beginning of May.



During our time together, we delved into the innovative initiatives currently underway within the GNR department and charted a course for future projects. The Redd Fish Restoration Society, a reputable registered charity dedicated to restoration, research, and education, proved to be a valuable partner in our discussions. With over 28 years of experience, Redd Fish (formerly known as Central Westcoast Forest Society) has been instrumental in ecological restoration efforts within the Hahuuḷi (territory) of the Nuučaanuḷ Nations in Clayoquot, Nootka, and Barkley Sound.

1.0 PURPOSE & SUMMARY

The Communications Officer is responsible for providing professional communication services, advice and support to SFN First Nation (“SFN”) administration; planning, developing, and implementing a comprehensive integrated Communications Program that reflects the SFN First Nation’s strategic direction, priorities, policies, programs, and initiatives. This includes working with SFN elected officials and departments to meet communications deliverables, including the coordination of events, advertising, and promotional materials. The Communications Officer’s primary responsibilities include writing, concept design, copy/photo editing and preparing media materials for distribution. The Communications Officer also assists with promotional materials for SFN departments and ensures products adhere to the visual identity guidelines.

2.0 DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES

- Implementing SFN’s strategic communication plans by designing effective and innovative publications, articles, graphics, briefing materials, press releases, and employee messaging.
- Provide all communications needs across the organization, including email marketing, social media, advertising, print publications, and management of websites.
- Work with external communications professionals and SFN leadership to develop an organization-wide integrated communications strategy.
- Prepare and implement SFN annual reports, and specific communications plans for General Assemblies, Community Consultations, Referendums, and any other SFN Government initiatives or events.
- Maintain and update SFN electronic media including the SFN website, Facebook page(s) and other social media platforms, updating events, calendars, news items, Chief & Council messaging, employment opportunities, departmental content, training and educational opportunities and deadlines, and general content, developing new materials as required and staying abreast of web and social media technology developments, methods, and platforms.
- Distribute communications-related items to the community and SFN membership.
- Providing training and instruction on the use of the web and social media when appropriate.
- Assist in the development of policies relating to internal and external communications.
- Maintain a working relationship with SFN Chief and Council with regards to the preparation of communications-related products. This may include working with a community-appointed representative and or committees of Council.
- Coordinate the display and printing of advertisements and other promotional material.
- Research, prepare, and distribute media-related materials, including media releases and backgrounders.
- Research new documentation relevant to advancing communications efforts, issues, and concerns for SFN.
- Update the SFN web site and facilitate internal web requests with discretion.
- Performs related duties as required.

1.0 PURPOSE & SUMMARY

The Maintenance Assistant is responsible for completing a variety of indoor and outdoor maintenance tasks. This position is responsible for the effective and safe use of available materials and equipment and must operate with minimal direct supervision. This position has been provided through the funding of Stó:Lō Aboriginal Skills & Employment Training (SASET).

2.0 DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES

- Maintain daily contact with the Maintenance Supervisor to confirm work priorities, report on accomplishments and discuss upcoming maintenance activities.
- Ensure the accurate and timely completion of paperwork required for purchase orders, timecards and activity reports.
- Ensure that building gutters flow freely to downspouts and that drains run clearly.
- Work in compliance with the Canada Labour Code, WCB and WHMIS rules and regulations at all times.
- Remove graffiti on exterior building walls and repaint area as necessary.
- Ensure building exterior windows are cleaned regularly.
- Prepare and paint building walls and trim as necessary.
- Provide assistance in the repairing of doors, windows, lights, switches and office furniture.
- Provide assistance in the repair of minor plumbing issues in relevant buildings.
- Inspect and assist in the maintenance of fire extinguishers and fire sprinkler systems.
- Provide assistance in the inspection of heating, cooling, water, and electrical systems to determine if they are functioning according to specifications and assist in minor repairs as required.
- Check alarms and respond to breaches in building security and reset alarm as required.
- Ensure that all doors and windows have functioning locks and repair or replace door locks as required.
- Operate and maintain equipment in a safe and cost-efficient manner.
- Maintain power and hand tools to ensure they are in good operating condition.
- Safeguard tools and equipment against vandalism or loss.
- Ensure that walkways, building entrances and parking lots are free from snow, debris.
- Plant and nurture trees and shrubs as required.
- Mow and water lawns and playing fields as scheduled.
- Remove snow from parking lots, paved areas and around buildings.
- Move and/or make minor repairs to office furniture.

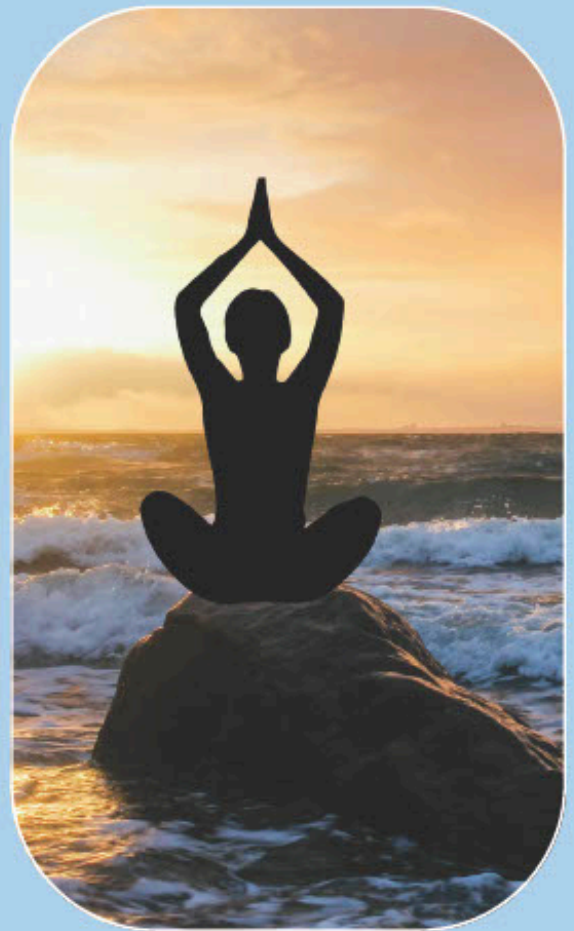

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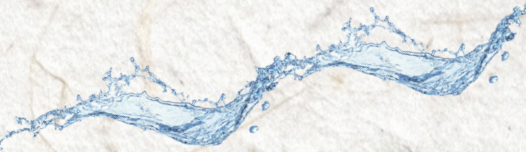

Should we allow Sumas Lake to return?

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The fact that the Sumas Prairie used to be a lake was news to a lot of people in 2021. That's when floodwater from an atmospheric river covered the prairie -- drawing national media attention. At the time, the Sumas First Nation took the opportunity to remind us all that settlers drained the lake for farmland in the 1920s. And that perhaps, keeping the lake at bay indefinitely, was not a sustainable option. That is the focus of a new research paper. It asks the question: should we allow the lake to return? The senior author is Tara Martin from UBC's Department of Forest & Conservation Sciences.

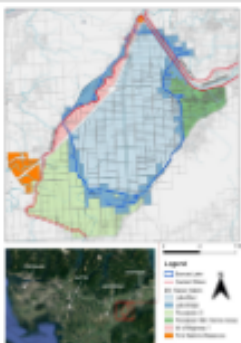
