

Environmental Management Plan Update (2024)

On April 2nd, a community engagement event was held to discuss members' concerns about environmental issues on reserve as well as members' priorities for environmental management.

A total of 26 members participated in this event. Feedback was also recorded from meetings with elders and one-on-one interviews performed with knowledge keepers. The results are as follows:

Top Environmental Management Concerns



Environmental Management Plan Update (2024) (Cont'd)

- **Air Quality** concerns about impacts of air pollutants emitted from local industrial factories (e.g., PVC pipe plant and asphalt plant) on human health and environment.
- Contaminated Soil concerns about diesel and fuel spills contaminating soil on reserve.
- **Groundwater** identified as a valuable resource at risk from poor fuel management and storage and impacts from surrounding agriculture.
- 4 Stormwater management concerns over localized flooding and contaminants entering fish habitat like Kilgard Creek and Marshall Lonzo Creek.
- **Fisheries resources** concerns over stability of access to salmon and impacts to their habitat from fuel spills, agriculture, and development.
- Plants & Wildlife concerns over decreased access to plants and animals and increased presence of invasive species.
- Garbage Handling & Disposal observations of illegal dumping on reserve.
- Land Development concerns over loss of habitat, especially on Sumas Mountain.

We are pleased to announce that through the hard work of Jenna Noppen, our Disaster Recovery Manager, Semá:th First Nation has been awarded a grant for Enhancing EOC Preparedness in the amount of \$30,000!

EOC's (emergency operations centres) are crucial hubs for emergency response; these centres provide fundamental safety co-ordination and planning.

Funded through the Community
Emergency Preparedness Fund (CEPF),
this provincial funding gives First
Nation's communities the chance to
acquire emergency response equipment,
offer training exercises for support staff,
purchase portable equipment, and more.



We're getting noticed! We've had members of the public take note of our GNR Department's work on fish tracking and tagging along the Vedder River in Chilliwack, BC.

The in-river fencing shown in the photos below are a Sumas First Nation solo sonar project; Sumas is using sonar technology to track fish migration and tracks species.

The solar panels also shown in the photos are a collaborative project between Sumas First Nation and UBC. These solar panels are being used to track pre-tagged fish using radio telemetry.







Seabird Island hosts this program and will schedule to come out and do your yardwork. They have been to Soowahlie.

Services include transportation, yard work, light housekeeping, minor home repairs, snow removal and friendly visits. By making these vital supports accessible at no cost, Better at Home empowers Elders to maintain connections to community and thrive within the homes they love.



Environmental Management Plan Update (2024)

On April 2nd, a community engagement event was held to discuss member's concerns about environmental issues on reserve as well as member's priorities for environmental management. A total of 26 members participated in this event. Feedback was also recorded from meetings with elders and one-on-one interviews performed with knowledge keepers.

The results are as follows:

Top Environmental Management Concerns



- Air Quality Concerns about impacts of air pollutants emitted from local industrial factories (e.g., PVC pipe plant and asphalt plant) on human health and environment.
- Contaminated soil Concerns about diesel and fuel spills contaminating soil on reserve.
- 3. Groundwater identified as a valued resource at risk from poor fuel management and storage and impacts from surrounding agriculture. Surface water was also identified as an important resource facing many of the same risks.
- 4. **Stormwater management** Concerns over localized flooding and contaminants entering fish habitat like Kilgard Creek and Marshall Lonzo Creek.
- 5. **Fisheries resources** Concerns over stability of access to salmon and impacts to their habitat from fuel spills, agriculture and development.
- Plants & Wildlife Concerns over decreased access to plants and animals and increased presence of invasive species.
- Garbage Handling & Disposal observations of illegal dumping on reserve.
- 8. Land Development concerns over loss of habitat, especially on Sumas Mountain.
